Create A Quiz

- 5 Multiple Choice Questions (with answers)
- 4 True and False Questions (with answers)
- 3 Matching Questions (with answers)
- 2 Fill in the blank Questions (with answers)
- 1 Short Answer (with answers)

Comic Strip

Create an 8 panel comic strip showing 8 major events from the book in sequence. Include captions and dialogue bubbles to retell the story along with pictures.

Book Jacket

Create a book jacket for the book you read. Make sure it looks different from the actual book jacket. Include the title, setting, characters and a short summary on the back.

Illustrated Timeline

Make an illustrated time- line sequencing 10 important events that happened in the book. Give an explanation of each event.

Poem/Song

Create a poem or a song that summarizes the story. Don't forget important elements like title, setting, conflict!

“This book...” Statements (Required)

Directions: For each book you read (2 total), create 15 statements about the book that explain different characters, setting, plot, major events, etc. These statements should be specific to the book you read; no generalizations. These statements will be used by the Battle of the Books Team to prepare for the competition!

Example: “This book took place in 1776 in America with the main character working a job as a blacksmith.”

“This book’s main character lived with his muggle aunt and uncle but received a letter delivered by owl that stated he was to become a wizard.”

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
